For-Profit vs Non-Profit Comparison

For-Profit

Purpose: Generate profit and deliver effective product and services valuable to consumers

Funding: Initial funds through bank loans, investors and sales revenue

Diversity of audience: Generate profit and deliver effective product and services valuable to consumers

Non-Profit

Purpose: Promotes a social cause or advocates based on its mission

Funding: Private donations, sponsorships, grants and now crowdfunding

Diversity of Audience: Messaging on product or service to a diverse audience of volunteers, donors, and corporations



For-Profit

Leadership: Concerned about profit and financial success with select group of individuals as leaders

Culture: Focuses on finances and business metrics with new products and markets

Taxation: Must pay taxes as the law requires

Staff: Paid employees and interns

Non-Profit

Leadership: Led and directed by board of directors (15-100) balance finances with social issues

Culture: More community oriented and not financially motivated

Taxes: Registered as a 501 (c)(3) to provide services for the public good with minimal taxes

Staff: Some employees with many volunteers



What Is A Project?



What Is A Project?

Definition:* "A project is a temporary endeavor undertaken to create a unique product, service or result."

- Characteristics:
 - Predetermined timeline
 - Clear beginning and end
 - Fixed budget
- Distinct from "operations"

- Specific deliverable
- Interrelated tasks
- Involves people



- Strategy to Increase Project Success
 - Goal: Improve execution of projects to meet organizational goals
 - What: Established approach to managing and controlling a project
 - How: Use flexible processes implemented within a knowledgeable organization using skilled practitioners



- PM Results for Organizations
 - Large PMI Study* confirmed positive results of project management across wide variety of organizations
 - Tangible results examples :
 - Ability to manage more projects with available resources
 - Improved response to regulatory/funding pressures
 - * PMI. Researching the Value of Project Management



Challenges For Non-Profits



- Non-Profit Environment
 - During economic downturns, non-profits are hit hard
 - During economic recoveries, non-profits tend to lag for-profits
 - Increasing pressure to "do more with less"

What have you experienced since 2008?



- Non-Profit Requirements Gathering
 - One PMI Chapter conducted requirements gathering to determine how they could help meet the community's needs by answering 2 questions:
 - How can PM help the non-profit community?
 - What does the non-profit community need from PMI?



- Non-Profits Told PMI...
 - Our projects take too long!
 - We need to be more efficient in delivering results!
 - Our recurring projects need repeatable results!
 - How do we know we are doing the right projects or that they're even feasible?
 - How can we use our resources more efficiently?



- Non-Profits Wanted...
 - A "show me how" approach in order to make the skill sustainable
 - Assistance in selling the discipline to management
 - An affordable solution in terms of both time and cost



PM Benefits For Non-Profits



- Benefits of PM for Non-profits
 - PM Adds Value
 - Better resource utilization
 - Elimination of "reinventing the wheel"
 - Benchmarks for measuring success
 - Improvements in organizational efficiency and productivity



- Benefits of PM for Non-profits
 - PM Adds Value (Cont'd)
 - Aligns expectations of all stakeholders
 - Mitigating risks
 - Provides processes that are scalable to any size project
 - Defines what "done" means

Your Mission...

The mission of Innovative Dance Company STL is to bring world-class dance companies that wouldn't otherwise be presented to the St. Louis region, makes this dance accessible to a widely diverse audience, nurtures local dancers and dance companies, and offers unique and transformative dance education outreach.

Innovative Dance Company STL has been in existence for the past 30 years.
