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Introduction

This one-year out baccalaureate survey was done to provide data for the University's undergraduate program reviews and other planning uses. Although it is the same format as the surveys done as part of the IBHE alumni survey series, it was done in addition to those. The scheduled survey this year was a one-year out survey of 1998 baccalaureate graduates, the results of which are reported separately.

After the first six years, the surveys were reviewed and changed, modifying some questions and value scales, and adding some additional questions. (See Appendix B for more detailed information on the "Public University Baccalaureate Graduates' Follow-Up Surveys.")

The current survey was administered during the spring of 1999 to 1998 baccalaureate graduates of SIUE. The questionnaire includes 18 questions common to all Illinois public universities. These are the first 18 questions in the survey, forming Parts I, II, III, and IV (Employment Questions, Education Questions, Satisfaction Questions, and Educational Practices Questions). SIUE added to these one question on industry of employment and three additional questions on educational practices, and appended three additional parts to the survey to add questions about advisement, program quality, and the undergraduate experience. (A questionnaire is included in Appendix A.)

Methodology

The survey questionnaire and a cover letter were adapted from the questionnaire and letter developed for previous surveys. SIUE Alumni Services provided current addresses for calendar year 1998 graduates as determined from institutional records. The survey was distributed in May 1999 to May 1998 baccalaureate graduates and in August 1999 to August 1998 and December 1998 baccalaureate graduates. Each envelope included a cover letter, a questionnaire, and a postage-paid, pre-addressed return envelope. Each questionnaire was stamped with a sequential, identifying number which was also stamped on a listing of the graduates (this aided in identifying the surveys when returned).

On May 6, 1999, approximately two weeks before the first set of surveys were to be mailed, a postcard was sent to the 689 May 1998 baccalaureate graduates for whom addresses were available, notifying the alumni that they would be receiving a questionnaire and encouraging them to complete and return the survey. Surveys were mailed first class on May 19, 1999. On June 3rd, approximately two weeks after the survey was mailed and when the rate of survey returns had decreased, a follow-up

postcard requesting that the survey be returned was mailed to each student who had not returned his or her survey.

The second distribution began with the preliminary postcard mailed on July 30, 1999 to the 724 August and December 1998 baccalaureate graduates with known addresses. Surveys were mailed first class to this group on August 13, 1999 with a follow-up post card mailed to non-responders on August 27, 1999.

Returned surveys began arriving on May 21st and continued through the summer and fall, with a few arriving as late as November 1999. As the surveys came in, each was matched with the corresponding stamped listing. The students' names were then checked against the alphabetic list of alumni to verify (or, if the alumnus chose not to provide the identification number, to obtain) the student identification number. The student identification number was the key which allowed merging of survey data with administrative records (e.g., biographic, graduation, matriculation, and enrollment information).


Faculty Accessible Outside Class




Students Encouraged to Work Cooperatively




Students Encouraged to Challenge Ideas




Faculty Used Appropriate Teaching Activities



Faculty Had High Expectations for Quality




Faculty Provided Timely Feedback
