Brief description of the nature of the research/creative activity?

My lab uses eye tracking and other experimental methods to investigate how humans create, use, and comprehend language. Recent topics of interest include novel word learning, bilingualism, ambiguous word recognition, context effects, and the role of spelling and vocabulary skills in supporting reading and learning. Some returning students may work with supervision to implement their own research project in the area of cognition and language processes.

Brief description of student responsibilities?

Students will be involved in many aspects of the research process. Responsibilities include developing materials, writing IRB applications, conducting a literature review, reading and summarizing journal articles, writing APA style summaries, working with participants, data collection, scoring measures, data analysis, reviewing manuscripts, and assisting with research proposals.

URCA Assistant positions are designed to provide students with *research or creative activities* experience. As such, there should be measurable, appropriate outcome goals. What exactly should your student(s) have learned by the end of this experience?

Students will have learned how to perform a literature review, read journal articles, summarize research, develop research questions and designs, create materials for psycholinguist research, analyze data and present results to a wider audience. At the end of the research project, students will submit to MPA or similar local or regional venue. Through this experience, students can expect to learn critical thinking, data visualization, and scientific communication skills.
